Delivery of a Newborn With Meconium-Stained Amniotic Fluid

Meconium Non-vigorous newborns with meconium stained fluid DO NOT require routine intubation and tracheal suctioning Newborn Resuscitation “Meconium stained amniotic fluid is a perinatal risk factor that requires the presence of one resuscitation team member with full resuscitation skills, including endotracheal intubation” -NRP Instructor ...
